

Community College honors Dr. David D. Palmer

In 1964, David D. Palmer, B.S., D.C., then-president of Palmer College of Chiropractic, opened Palmer Junior College, a liberal arts associate-degree-granting institution. On Aug. 1, 1979, the Eastern Iowa Community Colleges (EICC) District Board of Directors, signed the contract that merged Palmer Junior College into the EICC District.

To recognize Dr. Dave for his leadership in growing EICC, a plaque is now prominently placed on the EICC campus to memorialize this moment in Quad Cities higher-education history.



Palmer College hosts SABCA Eastern and Central Regional Conferences







PALMER LICENSURE COMPLETION RATE







Daring & Driven: The Campaign for Palmer College Celebrates Tremendous Success

Palmer College of Chiropractic isn't new to making history. And the College did it again with the successful completion of Daring & Driven: The Campaign for Palmer College, the largest fundraising campaign undertaken by any chiropractic college – ever. The six-year comprehensive campaign ended in September 2023 with more than \$30 million raised, surpassing a goal of \$25 million.













DARING AND DRIVEN BY THE NUMBERS

The success of the campaign was also recognized with a Silver Circle of Excellence Award by the Council for Advancement and Support of Education (CASE) as part of their annual awards program.

"What a success story for Palmer College, which, before the campaign, had .8% alumni participation, a deficient database, and no fundraising staff," explained one of the competition judges. "How can we not all be reminded of what can be accomplished through a systematic approach, strategic advanced planning, sheer optimism, and unrelenting effort?"

CASE's Circle of Excellence Awards are the premier recognition program for educational advancement. These peer-selected and adjudicated awards celebrate colleges, universities and schools worldwide whose talented staff have advanced their institutions with resourcefulness and ingenuity.

This year, volunteer judges from CASE's membership reviewed more than 4,200 entries from 28 countries and selected 486 exemplary entries for bronze, silver, gold, and grand gold recognition across multiple categories.

Referrers by the Numbers

Referrals from Palmer alumni and friends of the College account for two-thirds of the student inquiries the College receives on an annual basis. Palmer recognizes those and friends for the impact they have made on Palmer College, simply by referring a student.

New Scholarship Initiative Launched

The new Student Success Scholarship Initiative was launched in early 2023 to provide financial support to all students who have the passion and drive to become a Doctor of Chiropractic at Palmer College. The program comprises two endowed scholarships: the Academic Scholarship and the Opportunity Scholarship. The Academic Scholarship requires a minimum GPA, while the Opportunity Scholarship does not, making every incoming student a potential recipient.





The Palmer College Alumni Office aims to "amplify Palmer pride" through the launch of the new Palmer Alumni Awards Program. The five prestigious awards, including the College's highest honor of Fellowship, recognize individuals who exemplify what it means to lead and serve, not only in the profession but also Palmer College.

The first round of nominations for the four inaugural awards were accepted in spring 2024, with more than 200 nominations submitted from Palmer alumni and friends. Palmer Chiropractic Clinics in the Community

Palmer Chiropractic Clinics provide students with real-world learning opportunities, including experience interacting with the public through community-engagement events.

In the Quad Cities, Palmer College partnered with the minor league hockey team, the Quad City Storm, as the official team chiropractic-care provider. We also brought awareness to the community through sponsored events at the Quad City Storm and the Quad Cities River Bandits, The QC's minor league baseball team.

Students gained experience caring for athletes at the Bix 7 Road Race, and the famous Palmer Spine was once again part of the race.





In Port Orange, the College established relationships with the Port Orange Family YMCA, hosting monthly community lectures. Students joined faculty clinicians at events with the Port Orange Parks and Rec Department, with the Daytona Tortugas minor league baseball team, and at multiple local sporting events including the Swamp 360 Mountain Bike event, Sula Challenge Obstacle and the Atlantic Coast Classic CrossFit Competition. Students also helped provide care at the North Florida Homeless At-Risk Veteran Stand Down event.

ADVANCING KNOWLEDGE THROUGH RESEARCH

VERDICT Reaches Project Milestone

In May 2024, the Palmer Center for Chiropractic Research (PCCR) reached a major project milestone by meeting its enrollment goal of 766 veterans in the clinical trial "Veteran Response to Dosage in Chiropractic Therapy (VERDICT)".

VERDICT will provide evidence to guide the number of visits in an initial course of care and an extended-care approach for veterans with chronic low-back pain. The trial finishes data collection in May 2025 with results following. Information on the effectiveness of the number of visits for chiropractic care can greatly assist Veterans Affairs in determining the number of Doctors of Chiropractic that will best meet the needs of veterans with chronic low-back pain.

VERDICT is a part of an \$81 million federally funded National Institutes of Health-Department of Defense-Veterans Affairs Pain Management Collaboratory that supports large-scale pragmatic clinical trials focusing on non-drug pain management approaches for active-duty and veteran populations, who experience high rates of chronic pain, which can negatively impact quality of life and increases the risk of opioid abuse.

This \$7 million, five-year clinical trial is led by the PCCR at chiropractic clinics in four Veterans Affairs Health facilities in collaboration with investigators at the University of Iowa, Yale University, Dartmouth Institute for Health Policy & Clinical Practice, and Duke University.

Palmer Dean of Research Named Most Highly-Published Researcher in Manual Therapy

Cynthia Long, Ph.D., PStat, dean of research at Palmer College of Chiropractic, was recognized as the most highly-published and collaborative researcher in manual therapy for people with low-back pain. Her research has focused on spinal manipulative therapy by chiropractors for patients with musculoskeletal pain.

Dr. Long joined the Palmer Center for Chiropractic Research at its inception in 1995. The Palmer Center for Chiropractic Research is the most highly funded and productive chiropractic research effort in the United States.

"Before 1995, Palmer and a number of colleges conducted chiropractic research, but Palmer's leadership decided to invest more heavily in research and expand and strengthen our work," says Dr. Long.

"What's unique about Palmer is that we took the most sustainable approach. Today we can look back and see that chiropractic research has influenced many realms of the profession, from curriculum, to practice, to the rise of multidisciplinary care settings and even policy. Palmer pushed the envelope by collaborating with high-level research institutions outside of chiropractic to grow and expand our reach. Today that research is used profession-wide and beyond."

Palmer Center for Chiropractic Research Engages Research Honors Students

Palmer students participating in the Research Honors program had the opportunity to support two research studies, under the guidance of faculty members.

The first study, "Spinal Manipulative Therapy vs. Prescription Drug Therapy for Care of Aged Medicare Beneficiaries with Neck Pain," utilized Medicare insurance claims to identify elderly patients with a neck pain diagnosis who chose one of two treatments, spinal manipulation or prescription drug therapy.



The study, led by Brian Anderson, D.C., M.P.H., M.S., Ph.D. was a collaboration with Southern California University of Health Sciences.

"The relationships the Palmer Center for Chiropractic Research has outside of Palmer College itself opens you up to opportunities you would have never known. I didn't realize we were connected to Yale, Dartmouth, Harvard, SCU, the list goes on. I have endless paths of networking after I graduate all because of the Research Honors Program," said Palmer Main Campus student Brandon Jackson.

The second study, led by Stacie Salsbury, Ph.D., R.N., is titled "Safety Culture in Community-Based Clinics Offering Spinal Manipulative Therapy: A Qualitative Analysis."

Palmer Florida student Amanda Brown said, "Participating in the Research Honors program has given me better communication skills, keeps me up to date with the knowledge in this industry, and has allowed me to network with different doctors and students from other colleges. Having this experience will give me the opportunity to stay in contact with colleagues well after graduation."




WHO Recognizes Spinal Manipulation in New Lower-Back Pain Guideline


The World Health Organization (WHO) has developed a guideline for proper management of chronic low-back pain (LBP) for the first time ever. Among the approved interventions, WHO recognizes spinal manipulative therapy as effective in the care of adults, including older people, with CPLBP.

Globally, LBP is the leading cause of disability, impacting 619 million people. That number has gone up 60% since 1990. According to the WHO, "Cases of LBP are expected to rise to an estimated 843 million by 2050, with the greatest growth anticipated in Africa and Asia, where populations are getting larger, and people are living longer."

The WHO states that people around the world deserve "holistic, person-centered, equitable, non-stigmatizing, non-discriminatory, integrated and coordinated" care. This newly developed guideline provides evidence-based direction for providers and indicates that spinal manipulative therapy can be a valuable and effective part of a patient's care.

The new guideline was coordinated by the Ageing and Health Unit, with further guidance from an independent methodologist. Guideline development relies on the findings of hundreds of research trials and publications, just like those being produced by the Palmer Center for Chiropractic Research.





Zacariah Shannon, D.C., M.S., Ph.D. Wins Early Career Research Award

Dr. Zac Shannon was awarded the Early Career Research Award at the World Federation of Chiropractic Biennial Congress.

The award recognized Dr. Shannon's paper reviewing the impact of chiropractic care on military personnel.

"It meant a lot to have the work recognized," says Dr. Shannon. "I depended on data from a previous Palmer trial, so it is another example of how we're building a body of knowledge — no work in research is truly individual."
